

### A Message from Neil

General Charles Gordon (1833-1885) was a brilliant soldier, an inspirational leader and a committed follower of Jesus. He successfully organised the defence of Khartoum in Sudan and died just two days before help arrived. He lived by the highest standards and was never interested in lining his own pockets. A special gold medal was made to honour him. It recorded the various battles he'd been in. He considered it his most prized possession.

When General Gordon died there was no sign of the medal. Friends were dismayed, fearing it had been stolen. It was only when they read his diary that the truth emerged. Some years earlier he'd heard of people in Manchester who had barely enough money to feed their children. So, he had the engraving removed from his medal and sent it (anonymously) to feed the hungry. In his diary he wrote, 'The last earthly thing I valued I have given to the Lord Jesus Christ today.'

In one of his parables Jesus talked about this. He said, 'I was hungry and you gave me something to eat.' Puzzled, the righteous asked, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and give you something to eat?' To which Jesus replied, 'Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it for me.' (Matthew 25:34-40).

Gift Day is an opportunity for us to share some of what God has given us. It is an opportunity to feed the hungry, provide care for the sick, care for creation, enhance the local community and spread the Word of Life. When we do these things and make the lives of others better, Jesus says, 'You are doing it for me.' Gift Day will be on Sunday 25 June. The enclosed leaflet gives details of the different projects being supported. Please read it and consider what you might be able to give.

#### "A Patchwork of Stories" by Judy Dinnen

My sister, Judy Dinnen, is a Church of England vicar and a published poet and has recently had a book published which is being sold in aid of a hospice.

Set in the context of the work and experience of a hospital chaplain, this book offers a variety of different ways of looking at the issues and joys of working in this field. The book is full of stories and poems about people she has met over many years as a chaplain, and gives little glimpses into the lives of patients as a healing, focused means of exploring the world.

As Judy says, "I hope these prayers, poems and stories will engage with the reader and offer insight and healing. The role of both chaplain and poet involves listening deeply, noting both expression and body language. Both roles have a spiritual dimension, opening up to life's meaning, the questions and pain of the patient."

Referring to her hospital placement, Judy says, "I witnessed pain and anguish. I also found a place, where watching alongside patients was deeply appreciated, and somehow there seemed to be a joy there; if joy can be taken as an embracing of a new depth of truth and love." Judy reflects too on how prayer is used and on the spirituality of those with no faith.

#### We Are All Connected

#### Painting by Ukrainian artist Tetiana Hurn.

Blue and yellow national colours and the iconic sunflower symbol are brought together in this painting. A female figure represents the women of Ukraine. Holding the sunflower to the ear is an imaginary means of communication and connecting people.

Wearing a national hand-embroidery dress in blue and white also references the Scottish Saltire and is in recognition of the artist's new adopted home.

Gazing out with an expression of hope, the message communicated and received by the symbolic figure is one of welcome and safety for Ukrainians in Scotland.

"We Are All Connected" artwork was created as a result of collaboration with pARTicipate arts group and North Berwick Environment and Heritage Trust.

In July 2022 Tetiana's artwork was installed in the art space of the old telephone booth at the former Post Office in the High Street, North Berwick.

In October 2022, she donated the main wood-panel painting to St. Andrew Black-adder Church for a temporary display. This initiative was kindly welcomed and accepted.

Tetiana and her 8-year-old son Nikolai came to Scotland in springtime 2022, arising from the war that started in Ukraine. Tetiana was already an acclaimed artist in Murals, Portraits and Icons.

They received a very warm welcome from Scottish people and were kindly hosted by a local family in North Berwick for their first 6 months.

On the first Sunday in North Berwick, Tetiana was introduced to St Andrew Blackadder Church. Since then, the compassionate church community has become a part of her safe space to go and heal from her traumatic hard times.

She and her son Nikolai regularly attended Sunday-worship and connected with local people. Her active social life has resulted in "giving back" and contributing to the local community through the media that she works with – Art.

#### St Andrew Sustainability Initiative: Guiding Principles

Now that our Sustainability initiative is underway, it's worth considering the broader principles that should undergird our work and actions. Here are some suggestions:

- 1. Focus. Sustainability is a huge topic, including for example:
  - a. climate change;
  - b. responsible waste management;
  - c. adequacy of food and water;
  - d. protection of biodiversity;
  - e. physical and mental wellbeing.

This makes it very easy to become scattered in our actions. The only solution is laser-like focus. We should aim to do a few things really well.

- Don't panic. We are truly standing on a burning platform. This will tempt us to rush into doing things willy-nilly! Panic is not the answer. It is the opposite of focus. It also risks actions being poorly thought out, or ineffective. We should carefully control and channel the growing head of steam for change.
- 3. <u>Get people involved</u>. There are already important 'voices in the wilderness' urging change. Such change leaders are often marginalised and portrayed as misguided alarmists or nuts. The lobby for status quo is deep and powerful. However, large, organised groups of principled, ordinary folk can drive enormous change. Getting people involved is therefore key.
- 4. Encourage change; Don't demonise. Some effective actions may be self-evident to many. However, we should seek to inform and support change, not make people feel guilty. Not everyone will immediately do everything they ideally could, but encouraging incremental change beats driving a divisive revolution.
- 5. Avoid rigid structures. New movements often seek to impose formal structure on the process from the word go. This is generally a mistake. Our main thrusts, and their effectiveness, are not yet clear. We may also include others from outside St Andrew Blackadder. We would do better delaying any formal structure just now.

- 6. Avoid overly simplistic solutions. People often do mind experiments, and push solutions that are confident but not well grounded on actual data e.g. if everyone would just get a bicycle ....! Making our planet more sustainable is going to require many real life changes, some more effective than others. We need to try many things, and emphasise what actually works.
- 7. <u>Stick to our principles</u>. The above is not a complete list, and you may have ideas for others. The important point is that we should constantly check our actions against such organising principles. We should also not forget that God is a very present help in our times of trouble, and we should regularly seek his help, support and guidance in our prayers.

The last Sunday of February, May, August, and November, at 9.30am and 10.30am.


Beacon Communion Service is on a Thursday near to the Sunday.
